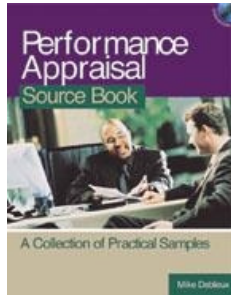

This web site examines four common areas of struggle and growth for mission/aid personnel. These four areas are described as Biblical metaphors representing the struggles that workers experience as they try to serve God in new ways or unfamiliar places. The site offers two resources: a) an article in five languages (Arabic, Chinese, English, Korean, Spanish) that can be used by individuals, couples, and teams for personal reflection and discussion; and b) the *CHOPS Inventory* in seven languages, to help assess struggles, successes, and strategies for adjustment/growth.

Tools for Accountability and Growth

Here are four tools to help workers, leaders, teams, and senders build relationships, assess how they are doing, and stimulate growth. The first three are adapted from Frontiers and the fourth is from Member Care Associates. Frontiers emphasises five areas of accountability/growth for all of their personnel: spiritual life, marriage/family, team relationships, relationships with nationals, and job/employment. Areas to Explore Together **Team Members, Team Leaders, and Field Directors.** **Adapted from Frontiers' Field Director's Office**

1. How can we rejoice with you? How has God blessed you and your efforts this last month?
2. What are your and/or your team's current challenging goals?
What are recent, measurable indications that the team is moving towards accomplishing them?
3. Comment on team morale, team dynamics and/or any other issues the team is working through.
4. What are areas or needs in which you and/or the team could benefit from outside coaching or other resources (i.e. things not currently being met by you or your team leader/field director)?
5. Please give a rough breakdown by percentage of how you used your available work/ministry time in an average week this last month.

Anvil Accountability Groups

The aim of an *anvil group* is to help friends/colleagues share at a deeper level—where masks come off and people are free to be who they really are. We want to be like *anvils* as a way to help 'iron sharpening iron' in each other's lives (Prov. 27:17). Heb. 10:24 says too, 'Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds.' And this is only one of 59 'one another' verses in the New Testament. Other relevant verses include: Gal. 6:1-2, 1 Thes 5:14, James 5:16, Heb. 3: 12-13.

The New Testament is full of words like 'strive', 'wrestle', 'put off, and 'get rid of' which show the need to work at our sanctification as well as to trust God to change us (Phil.2:12-13). One way to do this is to get others to 'speak the truth in love' to us about areas of weakness. They can then pray with us about these and help us to grow. Women generally find it easy to talk about personal issues while men often find it hard to share on a personal level, especially if there are women present! Usually men find it easier to share in an all-male group. Women may also find it easier to share in an all-female group.

Of course we need to guard against the danger of becoming too introspective and inward-looking. In general things in the group should not be allowed to become too 'heavy'—at least not too often. There should be room for a few laughs as well! Two to four people in a group is probably good to allow enough time for sharing. Some groups find it helpful to meet for a short time each week. Others prefer to meet every two-three weeks.

Those starting out in a group need to think through such issues as:

1. How private are our conversations? Will we tell spouses about the issues of others in the group?
2. How will we help each other to walk in the light (1 John 1:5)? Intimacy takes some hard work!
3. How can we remain peers in the group without one person becoming the leader or problem solver?
4. What does each of us expect from the group: accountability, prayer, empathy, problem solving?
5. Where and how often should the group meet?
